Interim Moderator's Message

Church is a place for one and many.

"The body is a unit, though it is made up of many parts; and though all its parts are many, they form one body. So, it is with Christ. For we were all baptized by one Spirit into one body--whether Jews or Greeks, slave or free--and we were all given the one Spirit to drink. Now the body is not made up of one part but of many............ The eye cannot say to the hand, "I don't need you!" And the head cannot say to the feet, "I don't need you!" On the contrary, those parts of the body that seem to be weaker are indispensable, and the parts that we think are less honorable we treat with special honor.But God has combined the members of the body and has given greater honor to the parts that lacked it, so that there should be no division in the body, but that its parts should have equal concern for each other. If one part suffers, every part suffers with it; if one part is honored, every part rejoices with it. Now you are the body of Christ, and each one of you is a part of it." (1 Corinthians 12:12-31)

I would like to highlight where the Apostle Paul said, "Now the body is not made up of one part but of many." The Apostle Paul reminds us we need to be one and many. As a church, we need to become a place for one but also for many. The kind of unity God desires is not created by ignoring and eliminating our differences. Unity in Rome was created by a military force; by asking ones with lesser power and wealth to follow the ones with more. I believe the kind of unity Jesus desires Christians to create, is by embracing and celebrating our differences with respect and love. I have seen too many churches destroyed by a poor leadership of "My way or the highway (Authoritarian leadership)" and by power struggles. I have met too many Christians who have mistaken being aggressive and disrespectful as being a strong Christian. Strong faith or leadership does not just come from asking others to follow what we say or demanding our own personal needs to be taken care of first, but true leadership comes from our willingness and humility to serve others. Jesus taught us the kind of leadership that creates true unity in Mark 10:42-25, "You know that the rulers in this world lord it over their people, and officials flaunt their authority over those under them. But among you it will be different. Whoever wants to be a leader among you must be your servant, and whoever wants to be first among you must be the slave of everyone else. For even the Son of Man came not to be

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served but to serve others and to give his life as a ransom for many." True unity is not created by one or two motions passed by a congregation but by our willingness to listen and serve each other as Jesus has served us.

"Whoever wants to be a leader among you must be your servant, and whoever wants to be first among you must be the slave of everyone else." This is not just a teaching for those who have certain leadership roles in the church, but for all of us who are called to follow God. It is my prayer that St Andrew's, Owen Sound becomes a place of one and many. Where all can celebrate God's blessing for us without being afraid of who they are and what they believe. This is my prayer that St Andrew's strives to become a healthy and respectful place where all are respected and included. Please, join us in such prayer.

The Board of Managers continues to meet monthly with the Session under the leadership of Rev. Chuck Moon. After mutually important topics are discussed, each group then continues with their individual meetings. This format is very important to ensure that both groups develop a close working relationship as we begin to prepare for the future of St Andrew's.

At our November meeting, the Board of Managers celebrated Nancy Robinson's 23 years as Church Office Manager. Nancy continues to serve St Andrew's in her position on the Board and we often call on her knowledge of the "workings" of this church!

The role of the Head Counter (Offering Supervisor) was revisited and it is now the responsibility of the Board of Managers (no longer the Session). A schedule was drawn up using Board members for the entire year. It is also the responsibility of this person to make certain that the Church is locked up after the collection is counted each Sunday. A modified fee structure for building usage was examined and will be implemented for "special groups". A small leak in the flat roof over the lounge led to the discovery of several other deficiencies and will be repaired when weather conditions are ideal.

At our December meeting, the budget for 2019 was finalized and will be presented at the Annual Meeting on Sunday February 24. The insurance policy was discussed and approved for the period December 2018 to December 2019. Auditing practices and procedures were discussed, and a new method will be set up at our January meeting. In view of the congregational response, it was decided that the Memorial Christmas tree will become an annual part of our Christmas celebrations.

Church Library Report

Featured Author: Michael Phillips

Michael Phillips began his writing career in 1977. He has written more than seventy books, both fiction and nonfiction. His best-selling books emphasize strong spiritual values and unforgettable characters. Most of his series have been best sellers in the Christian market.

Phillips discovered the writings of Victorian Scotsman George MacDonald, whose books had a huge impact in leading C.S. Lewis out of atheism into Christianity and he has made it his life's work and passion to bring to public attention the literary and spiritual links between MacDonald and Lewis. He is considered among the world's foremost promoters of MacDonald's message, with insight into the Scotsman's heart and spiritual vision.

In order to bring MacDonald's name back into prominence, he released updated and edited editions of MacDonald's novels which has resulted in a new generation of readers having access to MacDonald's books again for themselves. His book, *George MacDonald, Scotland's Beloved Storyteller*, was the first major biography of MacDonald produced in the U.S. and is still one of the best-selling MacDonald biographies of all time.

Phillips and his wife live in the U.S. and make their second home in Scotland.

Used eyeglasses and eyeglass cases are cleaned and sorted by Pearle Vision in the Heritage Place Mall. These glasses and others are sent to third world countries to be given to those who can't afford but need them.

Pop Can Tabs are collected by the Owen Sound Legion. The money received pays for wheel chairs for those who need them. This charity began in 1988 at the Elora Legion and to date, over 2,000-wheel chairs have been donated by branches in South Western Ontario.

Foreign Stamps are being saved for the Leprosy Mission. Foreign stamps and higher value stamps are preferred. Please leave in the plastic drawers by the coat rack across from the church office.

Milk Bags are used to offer people without beds a durable and washable alternative to sleeping on the often cold and damp ground. Not only can these milk-bag mats provide comfort as a bedding alternative but have been used by health-care professionals as a make-ready substitute for an operating bed/table where resources are scare. It takes approximately 500 milk bags to make an adult sized mat. Please leave in the box on top of the coat rack across form the church office.
